In the beginning was the idea...

There is no doubt: Anderson Senior Follies has become the largest and best attended senior theater program in the entire Southeast.

Besides their performances each year on the stage at Anderson University, the Follies has performed at military bases, Spoleto, and on cruise ships throughout the region.

But, where did this phenomenal example of senior theater begin?

Anderson Senior Follies began in the mind of then Anderson College President Dr. Mark L. Hopkins who saw another organization performing at a national convention. In the spirit of "America Has Talent," Hopkins knew we could do it, too.

He came home and presented his idea to Dr. David Larson and Music Department Head Dr. James Clark. A trip to Brainerd, Minn., to see another senior theater group at work showed them what was possible. Soon, there was an advertisement in the local newspaper for anyone interested in putting on a show to come to the college for tryouts.

Seventy-four hopeful seniors showed up for that first tryout in 1989. Thirteen of those had been professional performers in their younger years. Three months later everyone who tried out was in that first show entitled "Meet Me at the Klondike Café."

College President Dr. Mark L. Hopkins had the idea for Senior Follies back in the late 1980s. He *later joined the cast.*

"I owe much to my Senior Follies experiences in improving my humorous presentations and developing my speaking career," he said. "I deeply appreciate Annette allowing me to have a degree of freedom to do my own thing."

It should be noted that no one who ever came to audition for a part in Senior Follies was ever turned away. Everyone who came ended up on the stage.

Larson, then head of the fine arts program and now Dean of the South Carolina School of the Arts, was the director of the first show. Larson has been a constant steady hand from the beginning of Senior Follies. Larson and current producer/director Annette Martin have guided the organization and show for the past three decades.

Today marks the thirtieth show for Martin. When she took it over she was a talented pianist with young children. Today, she is a grandmother who actually qualifies to be in the show as a senior.

Who could have envisioned the great success of Anderson Senior Follies over the years? Hopkins quickly answers, "I could. It was obvious from visiting local churches and seeing community theater over the years that Anderson had a talented population.

"If it could be done anywhere," he said, "we could certainly do it here."

Venue improvements make our acts classier

Since 1994, Anderson Senior Follies has been gifting Anderson University with many upgrades to Henderson Auditorium and to the other venues at South Carolina School of the Arts.

You might be surprised by the lengthy list of big ticket items Anderson Senior Follies has purchased for the University. As a result of these ongoing upgrades, every event in Henderson Auditorium, among other places, has the opportunity to reap the rewards of the Senior Follies' efforts.


The money raised has come from show sponsorships, ticket sales, and the many hours of love and labor by the Senior Follies cast.

We are proud of this lasting legacy from our cast members, both past and present.

Thanks to support from our sponsors, we've been able to keep ticket prices more reasonable while simultaneously providing the following improvements to Henderson Auditorium.

- Two professional follow spot lights and installation of new positions
- Three stage floors, including a fully sprung floor across the entire stage
- Two sound system upgrades; speakers, amplifiers, mixing boards
- Dimming system for house lighting
- Computerized lighting control system
- Design and construction of two new dressing rooms
- Full set of six stage leg curtains and teasers for the stage
- Approximately 24 stage lights
- Support for new Steinway piano in Daniel Recital Hall

- Fiber optic star curtain
- Six computers for the Music Technology Laboratory and Administrative Office
- Multiple computers, software and ticket printer for the Rainey Fine Arts Center Box Office
- Vendini online ticketing system, network access, digital scanners, ticket printer, software
- Eight wireless mic sets, eight wireless communication headsets
- Three portable sound systems, each replacing previous one for Senior Follies To Go
- Two equipment upgrades for the Recording Studio including mixing boards, software
- Front to back of house digital cable to connect sound and lights under auditorium floor
- Additional wireless radio headset system with 8
- 12 lavalier wireless and 6 headword wireless condenser mics


Throughout the production weekend, over 85 bus loads of folks come to enjoy the show as well as thousands of cars.

Under the expert direction of Beth Cribbe, the traveling troupe of Anderson Senior Follies *To Go* has been the primary entertaining and marketing outreach aspect of Senior Follies since its conception.

Beth joined the Follies in 2009 and agreed to take over *To Go* from then-coordinator Darrell Sage. In her 10 years of direction, this outreach organization has performed 160 shows, and taken in \$9,486 in donations. Of those donating, many have become sponsors.

Not only does Beth direct the shows, but she often serves as the emcee, records the soundtracks, coordinates travel, and joins the 10 to 20 other entertainers, depending on the performance needs.

These shows do not include all of the costumes and technical aspects of the big Henderson Auditorium productions, but more importantly, *To Go* includes the talents and volunteer hours of cast members who participate.

Although there is no charge for the traveling shows, many groups put *To Go* in their budgets or take up a "love offering" to offset some of the expenses of performances. Often meals are offered as a gesture of appreciation as well.

To Go is happy to bring smiles and talent to any group from 10 to 250. As Beth is stepping down this year, a new experienced performer/radio personality/musician/recording artist is taking her place: Boyce Skelton.

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



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
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University's print shop keeps us rolling behind the scenes

> Next: Proofread again. Is this the second or fifth time I've seen this page? "Sorry, Nathan, I didn't catch that typographical error the first two times I read it." (Must have been a gremlin in computer transmission from me to you.)

We try hard to make the program "just right." It's easier now that we have the Internet.

Next deadline: Nathan sends the pages to The Journal for printing. Then it's Tina's turn to make sure everything is ready to print.

The presses roll, and you have the finished product in your hands: the Program for the 2019 Senior Follies 30th anniversary production, "A Class Act."
