How Bucket List Came to Be

So how did Bucket List evolve? it over to Reed Halvorson, who then Gail Brown, a current Follies member, planted the seed for the concept of Bucket List a couple of years ago. After deciding on the name, we thought that it would be great fun to get the audience in on the action, so, during the 2023 show, we asked you to share your Bucket List with us. Well, we got over 3,000 responses! About 57% included dream travel destinations, ranging from driving the Blue Ridge Parkway, a train trip across the US, or cruising to Hawaii. While travel was the number one category, other dreams involved good health and relationships with God and Family. Still others were more interested in experiences and adventures - like swimming with sharks or skydiving. Many others wanted to learn something new – like a foreign language or playing a musical instrument.

As I sat down with a team of people to write this show, I had absolutely no idea what this show would be about. After tallying all the lists, we knew travel had to be a big part of it. So, there we sat, Gail Brown, Kris Yon, Will Nickles, Reed Halvorson and me, with a list of 3047 bucket list items and a blank page. After several sessions of "throwing things against the wall to see what would stick", we finally came up with a structure for the storyline. From there, we developed the characters, their back stories and situations, songs that fit the storyline and – hopefully – moves the story forward. We then handed wrote the dialogue.

It is crazy now to look back and see how the show evolved and how each member of the team contributed. It was truly a magical 'think tank' experience. Gail was very instrumental in finding the music and helping with the storyline. Kris gave a specific voice to Alice and her phobias as well as giving insight to Issac the Pilot. Will was instrumental in our space adventure. Reed then brought these characters to life through his creative dialogue. He was able to introduce each character so efficiently that the audience will immediately know what each character is about.

It was also fun to see how each piece of music came to be included in the show. We found the opening song, Until You Can't at Dollywood last year – a trip the Follies gave me after last year's show. I immediately texted the team, "I FOUND OUR OPENING SONG!" Reed was driving down the road with his girlfriend and heard the ending song, What About Now. He immediately texted me and said listen to this! Five of the songs were new to me, so I imagine there may be a song or two that you are unfamiliar with as well. The script is not without its inside jokes and special nuances, either... things you may not notice. For instance, the first letters of the characters' names spell: "DO A BUCKET LIST". Our main character, Dr. Owen Albright's initials are D.O.A. (You'll have to watch the show to understand

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
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



This year she is performing again but has also stepped into the role of choreographer. She has donated 100s of hours choreographing and brainstorming movements with me. She is an experienced performer, teacher, and choreographer with formal training in ballet, jazz, tap, gymnastics and ballroom. Sherry has been dancing for 59 years and has trained under many renowned dancers such as Gus Giordano, Frank Hatchett, and Betty Bandyk. Originating from Michigan, Sherry owned a Performing Arts School for 42 years and has pretty

much become our resident choreographer! Her contribution to the show has been invaluable. We are so grateful that she is willing to share her gifts and talents with the Follies – and with you!

Kris Yon and I have worked together for 20 years on dozens of projects. She is my muse, my creative partner, and my dear friend. 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Meet the Bucket List Band

When you walked in, I am sure you noticed that our Follies Band was missing from the stage!!! Have no fear, they are tucked away in the choir loft and are still under the brilliant direction of our Follies Band Leader, Joe Wehunt. We are so very fortunate to have Joe on the Follies team. Joe is currently an Assistant Professor of Music at Anderson University and Music Director at Brookwood Church. He has a degree in Music Theory and Composition and a Master's in Music and Worship. He has played in the Orchestras of Bob Hope, George Burns, The Fifth Dimension, Debbie Reynolds, Jim Nabors, Mickey Rooney, Ann Miller, Johnny Nash, Ringling Bros. Barnum & Bailey Circus and the Broadway traveling productions of A Chorus Line and Sugar Babies (starring Mickey Rooney and Ann Miller). Joe has written TV commercial compositions for Verizon Wireless, Home Depot, Craftsman Tools, Chris Christie, Ridgid and Ryobi Tools. Joe won an Addy's Best in Show Award for his Music Score on the Frezee Center's TV spot "Conductor" along with several Gold and Silver Addy Awards. Joe has had extensive experience as a theatrical music director and conductor. A highlight in Joe's career was being awarded the job of composing the Carolina Panthers Theme Music Package.

On the woodwinds, is Alan Nowell. Alan Nowell is a native of Anderson, SC. He has an AA degree in Music Performance from Anderson College and a BA in Music Ed from Newberry College. He earned a Master's degree in Music Education from Anderson University in 2013. For 30 years, he was a music educator in Anderson

5, primarily teaching instrumental music. Alan's performance history includes a national and international four-year tour with The Spurrlows, followed by a tour with the contemporary Christian group TRUTH. He has also performed with the Tommy Dorsey Orchestra, The Guy Lombardo Orchestra, The Temptations, The Four Tops, and numerous others. Alan currently freelances and may be seen as a sideman in many local beach and pop groups, theaters, and churches. He also enjoys performing and serving as Director of the Electric City Big Band.

On percussion, we have Randall Roark, a Union, S.C. native. He started playing drums at the age of five when he received his first sparkly, metallic red five-piece drum set 49 years ago, and he has been playing ever since. Following high school, he pursued a professional career as a drummer for numerous bands, the longest with The East Coast Band, a Spartanburg, SC-based party and dance band. For 20 years, he toured with the East Coast Band throughout the Southeast performing in public and private events including Littlejohn Coliseum in Clemson, SC, Cooper Manning's wedding reception (of the Manning family – football greats Peyton, Eli, and Archie). With the East Coast Band, he was a lineup with the Embers and Maurice Williams and the Zodiacs, and recorded three albums. He is currently in his 12th year at Anderson University, serving Anderson University's IT department as the Director of Academic Technology and Media Services.

Playing the trumpet is Chris Wilson. We are absolutely thrilled to have our first FOLLIES MEMBER play

in the Follies Band. Chris was born in upstate New York, grew up in the Baltimore suburbs, where he lived until he attended Penn State to study Music Education. His first teaching job was on the Navajo reservation in Arizona, which was a real education for HIM. Not being one for such isolation he went back to the east coast, switched careers, and joined the Air Force. He flew for seven years as a navigator and then returned to Baltimore to become a home improvement contractor. He then moved to Long Island, NY in 1993 and returned to the public schools as a band director. He earned a Master's in Music Theory/ Composition from the Long Island University, CW Post campus, and a Doctorate in Educational Leadership from The University of Phoenix. In 2021, he retired from teaching, moved to South Carolina and has been enjoying himself ever since. We are thrilled that he has found the Follies in his retirement.



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Put Astrophotography on your Bucket List!!!

The stunning images of space shown prior to the show were taken by Bill Griffith, mostly from his backyard! Bill, a local retired physician, has been interested in astronomy and photography his entire life and has now combined his love of both into the fascinating "out-of-this-world" field of astrophotography. For three

years, Bill has reached out into deep space and captured fantastic images of distant nebulae, stars, galaxies, and objects far too distant or dim to see with the naked eye. Photography makes it possible to see what the human eye cannot, but it is not so simple as "point and shoot". Learning to image celestial objects is challenging. Depending on the

target, images can be obtained one realizes the vastness of space, with a basic camera and lens that might be in most photographers' homes. But astrophotography can be like buying a boat. The more you want to do, the more involved it becomes.

Bill says that good astrophotography is always rewarding, but it can be humbling as well! When

the innumerable galaxies - each containing trillions of stars! - it puts the grandness of our universe into perspective.
